

The Goal: To create a turn-key childcare center

The Walsh County Childcare Center undertaking the capital investment through grants. Cash flow does not support debt service.

A private provider will pay a monthly rent.

The provider will increase from a group license (up to 30 children) to a center license with 25-35 more slots.

The number of providers licensed as a center in Walsh County.

Lil' Spuds Childcare is a partnership of the Valley-Edinburg School District and is located in the Hoople school.







The How: Partnerships & Grant Funds

Developer: Walsh County JDA

Partners: Red River CHDO and City of Grafton

WCJDA conducted need survey, assessed 10+ buildings, purchased a building, procured an architect, and awarded bids for construction. Staff has secured grants from 10 sources, and is managing grants and payments. Board members have also volunteered.

When complete, ownership will be transferred to the Red River CHDO, a nonprofit.

The City of Grafton has contributed \$110,000, is providing interim financing while continued fundraising, providing utilities for 2024 and Q1 of 2025 and considering a \$100,000 Challenge Grant. City is also providing a temporary location.

The Provider:

In late 2022, all area licensed childcare providers were consulted on interest in expanding to a center to serve more children within the grant timeline.

Grafton provider responded: Rocking Horse - owned by Amber Osowski

The Why:

Lack of quality childcare and housing have repeatedly been identified by our employers as the major barriers to workforce recruitment and retention.





Company growth plans put on hold

90% of regional rural businesses have growth plans.

The key barriers include lack of:

- workforce
- childcare
- housing



Walsh County: a childcare "desert"

One of ND's 15 high-need counties, with just 29% of the needed supply to meet demand.



2022 Regional parent needs survey

556 respondents:

- 79% said work is affected when childcare fell through
- 37% were on waitlists (up to 3 years)



40 children enrolled = 38 parents working in these sectors:



















Childcare is essential to the region's economy.




Total Project Cost: \$1.4 million Renovation: \$21,000/slot vs. New Construction: \$40,000/slot

Funds Secured/Pending:

- \$988,220
- \$100,000 Grafton
- Challenge Grant
 - 10 sources

Gap: \$308,331







Hurdles

- Finding adequate, available building
- Quick state grant deadlines
- Lack of childcare facility grants adequate to support capital investments
- Unexpected/regulatory costs: fire suppression (\$100k); asbestos abatement (\$77k); new HVAC system (\$331k); new water line for fire suppression; architectural fees \$80k
- Funding gap despite 10 funding sources
- Stretched funding budgets impacting other projects (exceeds JDA's annual project budget)
- Stretched development staff capacity for nearly 3 years








State Suggestions

- 75% planning and capital grants for nonprofit or publicly-owned facilities in small towns
- \$2 million+ was invested in childcare expansion in Region 4 through two rounds of workforce grants (RWIP), with more needed. It is expected childcare will <u>not</u> be eligible in future RWIP programs. Where will this support come from?
- Enable additional grant requests for actual costs
- Allow retroactive grants for previously-awarded projects to 75% threshold in 2025
- Adequate grant lead times
 - Stable source of funding
 - Review regulations that increase cost



Framing new walls has begun



REGION 4 HURDLES

A 2022 regional childcare provider survey (84 respondents)

- 61% indicated the lack of funds and a facility were the major barriers to increasing childcare capacity
- 25% interested in expanding if an affordable facility were available

A center license requires the director have a Child Development associate's or bachelor's degree in early childhood education or related field.



If a provider were able secure a \$1.4 million loan to renovate a building:

Max capacity & no rate increase = \$45,000/month in income

Payroll = \$30,000/month

\$15,000/month remains for*:

Food, liability insurance, building maintenance and snow removal, employee benefits, and loan repayment

*Does not include costs to scale up/add capacity (i.e. cribs, tables, chairs, etc.)
